A SENSE OF ORDINARY TIME



What do the words "Ordinary Time" mean? Dorothy Day observed, "The words 'Ordinary Time' in our prayer books put me in a state of confusion and irritation. To me no time is ordinary." She was right. The "Ordinary" in "Ordinary Time" refers to ordinal—counted—time, not to lack of something to celebrate. Here is what the Roman document, *General Norms for the Liturgical Year and Calendar*, has to say: "Apart from those seasons having their own and distinctive characters (Advent, Christmastime, Lent, Triduum, and Eastertime), 33 or 34 weeks remain in the yearly cycle that do not celebrate a specific aspect of the mystery of Christ. Rather, especially on the Sundays, they are devoted to the mystery of Christ in all aspects."

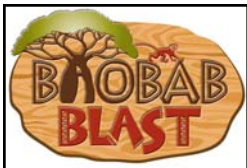
How do we celebrate "the mystery of Christ in all its aspects?" We gather every Sunday. Sunday is the original feast day in our tradition. Christians have gathered every Sunday—the day of Christ's resurrection, the first day of the week—every since there were Christians.

Each year there are two blocks of Ordinary Time, one in the winter between Christmastime and Lent, and the other stretching through summer and fall, from Pentecost through Christ the King. When we gather on Sundays in Ordinary Time, as always, we hear the scriptures proclaimed. The first readings, from the Hebrew Scriptures, were chosen for their relationship with the gospel passages—this summer and fall we will read 15 different books. For the second readings, we listen to Paul's second letter to the Corinthians and his letter to the Ephesians; we also hear from the letter of James and the letter to the Hebrews. The mystery of Christ "in all aspects" unfolds.

What is the heart of our Sunday celebration? We do our Eucharist; that is, we do our thanksgiving. We praise and thank God for all creations; we pray for the whole world, as we remember Christ's life, death, and resurrection. We share the bread and wine, the body and blood. We are sent forth to be the body and blood of Christ in our homes, our workplaces, our neighborhoods, our towns, our cities, our country, our world.

"What happens in our churches every Sunday is the fruit of our week. What happens as the fruit of the week past is the beginning of the week to come. Sunday is simultaneously a point of arrival and departure for Christians on their way to the fullness of the kingdom. This is no ordinary at all. This is the fabric of Christian living." (*Saint Andrew Bible Missal*, {Brooklyn: Willian J. Hirten, Co., 1982})

What is RCIA?

In some parishes, the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults is called "OCIA" or "Order of the Christian Initiation of Adults." Both names refer to the same thing; a series of rites, conducted in the context of learning about the faith and spiritual formation, through which a person is fully incorporated into the Body of Christ, the Church.

There are four stages in the RCIA: the Precatechumenate, or period of inquiry and evangelization; the Catechumenate, which is a time of serious and dedicated formation; the Period of Purification and Enlightenment, which coincides with Lent; and Mystagogy, which lasts from Easter to Pentecost. All of these stages are marked by distinct liturgical rites.

Participate well. Pray sincerely. Sing the hymns. Contribute generously to the collection. Some people contribute sparingly. But the church you are visiting has generously provided you a place to worship. Its members would appreciate a spot in the budget you made to enjoy your vacation.

If you know in advance that you cannot attend Mass some Sunday, you should obtain a dispensation from your pastor. If you are in your own church when visitors arrive, help them feel welcome; show them around. Above all, make an effort to worship every Sunday, even when you are away from home. God never take a vacation from you.
