We will walk back into our familiar worlds of family, work, and community. And there we will continue to draw from these mysteries and, God willing, share them with others.

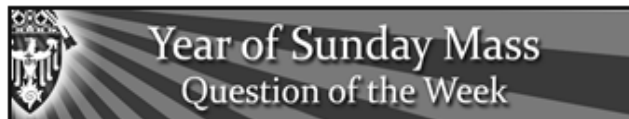

St. Anthony Of Padua

St. Anthony of Padua is best known in popular piety as the saint to whom you turn when you lose something. Many believers can tell stories of articles rediscovered after praying for Anthony's intercession. He should not be confused with Anthony the abbot, whose memorial is January 17. That saint lived to be 100 years old, dwelling in the desert and committed to self-denial - he is probably delighted every time you lose something! If you want your possessions back, Anthony of Padua is your intercessor.

Anthony was born in 1195 in Lisbon and joined the Franciscans at an early age. He felt called to the missions in Morocco, but he shipwrecked on the shores of Sicily. He ended up in Padua, where he became famous as a preacher and where the Italians adopted him as their own. When people heard Anthony preach, they reformed their lives. They reconciled with one another. They returned stolen property. They forgave debts. Anthony knew the Bible well, and he could present complicated teachings in simple language. He has been named one of the doctors of the church.

In statues and paintings, Anthony is often shown holding an open book on which sits the Christ Child. Anthony held the word of God and preached the word of God, so that people could hear and understand the Word-made-flesh, Jesus Christ. He made Christ as approachable as a child. The one thing Anthony probably most wants us never to lose and always to find is Christ in the word of God.

The collect for his memorial on June 13 names Anthony as an outstanding preacher and as an intercessor for people in their times of need. This prayer recalls both his life on earth and his ministry in heaven.
